### *Grammar Review #1*

#### **Scenario #1: Tag at the beginning**

EXAMPLE: Ms. Martin said, "Reading is awesome."

- Comma \_\_\_\_\_ opening quotation mark \_\_\_\_\_ tag
- Capitalize beginning of dialogue sentence inside quotation marks
- Period at end of dialogue sentence \_\_\_\_\_ quotation marks

PRACTICE: Mom said do your homework

PRACTICE: I replied my homework is already done

#### **Scenario #2: Tag at the end**

EXAMPLE: "Reading is awesome," said Ms. Martin.

- Capitalize beginning of dialogue sentence inside quotation marks
- Comma at end of dialogue sentence \_\_\_\_\_ quotation marks
- Period \_\_\_\_\_ the tag at the end of the sentence

PRACTICE: do your homework mom said

PRACTICE: my homework is already done I replied

#### **Scenario #3: Tag in the middle**

EXAMPLE: "Reading is," said Ms. Martin, "awesome."

- Capitalize beginning of dialogue sentence inside quotation marks
- Comma \_\_\_\_\_ quotation marks before tag
- Comma \_\_\_\_\_ quotation marks after tag
- Lower case second part of dialogue sentence to indicate same sentence
- Period at end of dialogue sentence \_\_\_\_\_ quotation marks

PRACTICE: do your mom said homework

PRACTICE: my homework I replied is already done

*If you have multiple dialogue sentences...*

- For scenario #1 and scenario #2....

- EVERYTHING STAYS THE SAME!
- Just add multiple sentences inside your quotation marks!

EXAMPLE: Ms. Martin said, "Reading is awesome. I love reading."

EXAMPLE: "Reading is awesome. I love reading," said Ms. Martin.

- For scenario #3...

- Capitalize beginning of dialogue sentence inside quotation marks
- Comma \_\_\_\_\_ quotation marks before tag
- Period after tag to COMPLETE that dialogue sentence
- Capitalize beginning of second dialogue sentence inside quotation marks
- Period at end of dialogue sentence \_\_\_\_\_ quotation marks

EXAMPLE: "Reading is awesome," said Ms. Martin. "I love reading."

*If you have ? or ! ...*

- For scenario #1...

- ? or ! at end of dialogue sentence \_\_\_\_\_ quotation marks

EXAMPLE: Ms. Martin said, "I super love reading!"

- For scenario #2...

- ? or ! at end of dialogue sentence \_\_\_\_\_ quotation marks

EXAMPLE: "I super love reading!" said Ms. Martin.

- For scenario #3...

- ? or ! at end of dialogue sentence \_\_\_\_\_ quotation marks

EXAMPLE: "I super," said Ms. Martin, "love reading!"

*If you have multiple speakers...*

- ALL SCENARIOS STAY THE SAME!
- BUT!... START NEW PARAGRAPH EACH TIME THE SPEAKER CHANGES!

EXAMPLE:

"Reading is awesome," said Ms. Martin. "I love reading!"

Ms. Poe said, "I also like reading."
