MOVING PREPOSITIONS TO THE BEGINNING OF SENTENCES CAN CREATE STRUCTUAL VARIETY!

- ➤ If you begin a sentence with a long prepositional phrase (four words or more), follow the phrase with a COMMA.
 - EXAMPLE: After many long and comprehensive tests, doctors discovered that Buzzy is allergic to tennis ball fuzz.
- ➤ If a sentence begins with two or more prepositional phrases, follow only the last phrase in the series with a COMMA.
 - WRONG = On rainy days, in July and August, flies hide in the wings of magpies to stay dry.
 - RIGHT = On rainy days in July and August, flies hide in the wings of magpies to stay dry.
- Sometimes you might choose, simply for clarity, to put a comma after a short prepositional phrase that begins a sentence.
 - In the dark, Earl's shark-shaped birthmark sparkles.
 - In 1992, 743 cows simultaneously refused to moo.
